**T**yndale House Foundation's impact this year has been primarily characterized by our desire for genuine biblical **partnership**. # In This Report

Tyndale House Foundation has always been somewhat unusual in the number and breadth of grants we give to ministries around the world each year. Most foundations either invest primarily in their local community or limit their grantmaking to a few specific priority funding areas. At Tyndale, we take a different approach, granting primarily outside the U.S. across a wide range of organizations and projects. We feel blessed to get to walk alongside so many different ministry leaders. However, having such a wide scope can get a little sticky when it comes to communicating our priorities outside of Tyndale.

In the past year, the Foundation team went through a process of clarifying and redefining our funding areas and priorities. We launched this revision to Foundation board members in our April grant cycle and have since taken additional steps to create language to share on our website and in other resources to help those seeking grant funds better understand and determine the possibility of a funding partnership.

Now with a full year of the new grantmaking categorization behind us, we are excited to share what we've learned with our partners, supporters, and collaborators.

In the pages that follow, you'll learn about each of our six primary funding categories. Each category opens with an introduction page that gives a general overview and description of the area. Within each area, you'll see that there are specific types of projects we look for. We refer to these as sub-priorities or sub-categories. When considering a proposal, it must fit within the general funding category and one of the sub-categories to move through the evaluation process. On the page that follows, you'll find grantmaking information for each funding category from 2022. The data represented on the page offers insights into the geographic areas of the world, people and language groups served, and other interesting callouts from the year. In the pages that follow, you'll find stories and testimonies to give you an inside look at the work carried out by our ministry partners, get a sense of some of the challenges they've faced, and join with us in celebrating their successes.

Before you dive into our individual funding areas, we'd like to mention three overarching priorities that we look for when considering and evaluating a project.

### **Local Leadership**

At Tyndale, we believe the most effective leaders are those who live in the context in which they work and serve. Though Tyndale House Foundation has almost 60 years of grantmaking experience on every continent, staff and board members tend to be specialists, not general ministry experts. So we depend on those managing and overseeing the projects on the ground to not only drive the work but have a deep understanding of the need and correct approach to getting the job done effectively.

### **Partnership**

From our years in grantmaking, we've learned that organizations who work in partnership with others succeed more often, have more sustainable ministries, and retain staff longer than organizations who try to do everything themselves. We believe partnership is a biblical principle that is essential to the ongoing work of ministry around the world. In each proposal, we look to see what other organizations are involved financially and non-financially and seek to understand how these partnerships enhance effectiveness and increase the likelihood of long-term success.

### **Integration of Faith**

With so much crisis, devastation, and injustice in the world, our desire is to not only provide physical and financial help but also spiritual hope in Christ. We seek to partner with organizations who integrate a faith component through sharing the good news of the gospel, offering Scripture in various forms, or journeying with people in their spiritual walk while also helping and providing for them holistically.

# Relief and Theological Work in Ukraine

ScholarLeaders collected and distributed more than \$1.8M in relief funds for Ukraine. Tyndale House Foundation was among the first to contribute.

Over the last year, **Overseas Council (OC)** and **ScholarLeaders (SL)** have helped mobilize more than \$1.8 million for work and rebuilding theological education in the war-torn nation of Ukraine. Tyndale House Foundation (along with Tyndale House Publishers) was among the first and most generous of donors to respond to the Russian invasion of Ukraine by supporting relief work through these partnering organizations. Within the first month, Taras Dyatlik, who works with both OC and SL, helped organize ten seminary hubs that worked collaboratively to mobilize hundreds of volunteers (an average of 270 per month), coordinate food distribution, assist with evacuations, house refugees, and provide spiritual care across Ukraine. As of October 2022, these networks had distributed some 3,000 tons of food and fed more than 300,000 people. They had conducted over 10,000 evacuations from “hard zones,” often driving vans of food and medical supplies in and then evacuating people—many of them elderly or disabled—to safety. During those first seven months of the war, some 40,000 refugees moved through seminary-run sites, often spending two to four days so they could receive warm meals, take a hot shower, and wash their clothes before moving farther to safety. While many of the long-term guests have also moved on, more than 500 refugees are still housed on seminary campuses, even as the schools resume their teaching and training roles.

In addition to the relief work, a partnership between the seminaries and the **Ukrainian Bible Society** has helped distribute tens of thousands of Bibles. In July and August alone, they gave away 29,000 complete Scriptures, 9,000 Bibles for children, and 39,500 New Testaments, many to soldiers heading to the front lines. The continual requests for Bibles have shown one way in which God’s redemptive activity is on display amid the horrors of the war.

After October, relief work began to slow as other NGO and government structures took more active roles. However, some relief continues. **Ukrainian Evangelical Theological Seminary** still feeds nearly 1,500 people each day. More than fifty internally displaced Ukrainians occupy the dorms at the seminary in Lviv. As the cold winter months arrived and Russia increased its

attacks on the power grid and infrastructure, donations provided dozens of generators, power stations, blankets, and other cold-weather needs. The seminaries and many of their church partners set up warming centers and charging stations to help care for people who spent many days without sufficient or consistent heat and electricity.

The theological leaders of these seminaries have proven effective, responsive, and efficient throughout these months. Churches have become trusted and recognized caregivers, with many Ukrainians meaningfully encountering evangelical Christians for the first time. The leaders describe having developed a “theology of presence,” which has given their witness credibility as they care for people’s physical needs and offer prayer, counsel, and spiritual care.

**There are approximately 4 million people in Ukraine who are internally displaced, and our partners have impacted 10 percent of that population over the last year.**

Since August, the seminary leaders have also made strides to re-engage their first calling as theological schools. They have resumed classes (primarily online) and developed short training courses for pastors in areas like trauma care and counseling. They face significant challenges, including the loss of faculty, ongoing economic challenges, and in the case of the **Tavriski Christian Institute** in Kherson, the complete destruction of their campus.

Evan Hunter, a member of the THF Board and VP at ScholarLeaders, has traveled to Ukraine three times in the last year. He is focusing on helping the schools meet their current challenges, develop theologically informed responses to issues such as trauma and resilience, citizenship and identity, and peace-building and reconciliation. These leaders have already lost friends, family, and church members to the war. They have experienced the trauma of so many nights of air-raid sirens and missile attacks. Yet, as Taras so often says, “The mission continues.” Please continue to pray for these leaders as they seek to bring comfort, aid, and hope amid the darkness.

## Literature Grants

\$1,185,650 awarded to 46 partners in 46 countries

Because Tyndale is a publishing enterprise, the Foundation places a special emphasis on international Christian publishing. We seek to partner with organizations working to meet the spiritual needs of people through the publication of literature consistent with biblical principles. We accomplish this through four priorities:

**Indigenous Publisher Support.** Supporting indigenous publishers to help create sustainable and flourishing Christian publishing industries. This includes supporting publishing networks, facilitating book and magazine publishers, providing printing support, and encouraging modernization of publishing methods.

**Resource Development.** Supporting the development of contextualized and relevant books and curriculums that will serve to edify the local church in areas where few resources exist.

**Bible Translation.** Making Scripture accessible and understandable for all people everywhere in their heart language.

**Distribution.** Partnering with organizations utilizing innovative approaches to distribute literature and serve local populations with biblical resources.

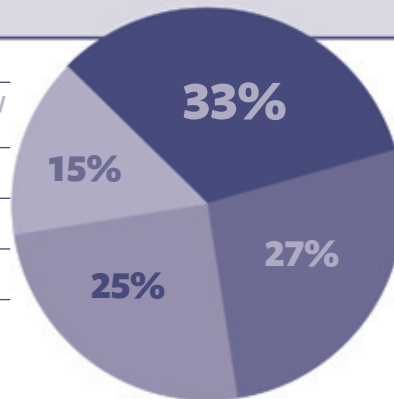

### India—Bible Translation

**Gujarati Christians** is a local ministry serving the 26 districts in the Gujarat state of India and the Gujarat diaspora all over the world. Their focus is the discipleship of the church through publishing books. In their work with the local church, they came to understand that the only Bible available was written in the old Gujarati language, making it difficult for people to understand God's Word. Through various conversations, they approached Tyndale House Foundation with a request to translate and publish the New Living Translation in Gujarati. They believed that this translation would be the best solution to meet the need for a modern, commonly spoken Gujarati-language Bible and that it would create an opportunity to reach out to millions of non-Christians and seekers. This partnership between Tyndale House Foundation and Gujarati Christians began in 2016. In 2022, they finished the editing, theological and linguistic review, typesetting, and proofing of the books from Joshua to Esther. They have already released some New Testament books such as the Gospel of John and anticipate completion of the whole Bible in 2023.



### Spain—Resource Development

University students in Spain spend their days bouncing around campus from classes to dining halls, sporting events, meetings, libraries, and dorms. Early classes and late-night studying make for long days, but days that pass by too quickly for most. This is a critical season in life as students prepare to engage in the world as contributing members of society. What's often forgotten is the importance of faith and integrating it into this season of preparation. However, **Asociacion Evangelica Grupos Bíblicos Unidos (GBU)**, a local publishing House in Spain, recognized this gap and has been focused on publishing books to encourage students and recent graduates to live in such a way that their faith overflows into everything they are and do. Their desire is to see good, biblically minded leaders stepping into areas of influence on and off campus. In 2022, GBU received a grant to translate and publish the *Gateway Series*, a seven-part series that covers seven books of the Bible and leads readers to a meaningful relationship with Christ. Translation is still in progress, but once complete, the publishing house will make the books available for purchase and hold seminars, inviting students to read through the books together and learn to love Jesus more.



### Undisclosed Location – Distribution

One of Tyndale House Foundation’s confidential ministry partners has been printing and distributing Bibles within a country where the church has been under attack. However, last year, they received word about a new Bible with Marxist undertones coming into print. A Bible like this could bring much harm to the local church and could mean that future printings of other Bibles would no longer be allowed. In response, they sought to maximize and intensify their own distribution of Bibles in 2022. In partnership with THF and other financial supporters, the organization raised all of their needed budgets and printed, transported, and distributed over 1,000 Bibles to pastors. This task wasn’t easy as they faced travel and COVID-related delays. This work must be done with the utmost sensitivity and care, because even though the distribution of Bibles is legal within the country, pastors and believers are reluctant to identify themselves with the church for fear of persecution. In addition to distributing the Bibles, pastors spend two-days with the organization where they receive training on how to study, prepare sermons, and preach the good news of the gospel.



### Uganda—Indigenous Publisher Support

In Uganda, radio is the most popular type of media. Given that nearly half of the population lives below the poverty line, radio is also the most affordable and effective means to reach people with the gospel. That’s why THF partner **Uganda Faith Writers Association** sought to utilize radio to bring hope and encouragement to believers and nonbelievers through daily drama programs. In 2022, they advertised a local scriptwriting competition, inviting submissions for ideas of plays that would be aired over the radio. Six people gathered for several days of workshops where they created an anthology of three plays, titled *The Way I See It*. The play brought a positive and inspiring message of hope during the difficult period of post-COVID lockdowns. They received such positive feedback from listeners that the plays will now be aired in multiple regions of the country and performed in churches. One of the writers realized that as she was writing, she was receiving insight into some personal situations she was going through and saw it as an opportunity to be vulnerable but also to receive healing. Once she opened up her heart, she was able to face her issues, receive restoration, and produce an exceptional play!

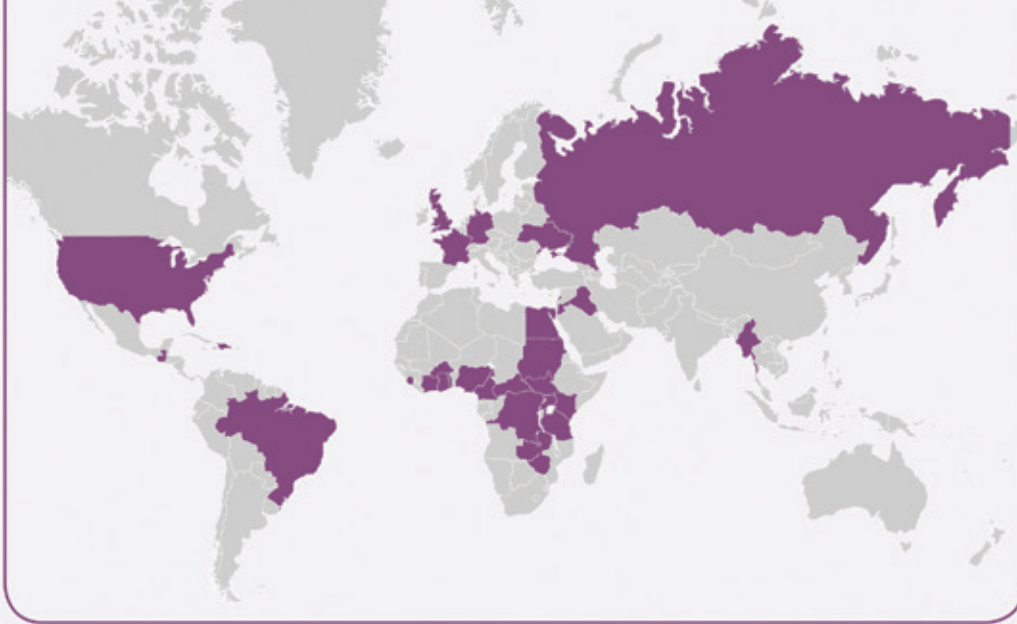

**Christian Education.** Faith-integrated education for students at the primary, secondary, collegiate, and graduate levels.

**Theological Education.** Formal post-graduate education of leaders from the majority world for service to the global church.

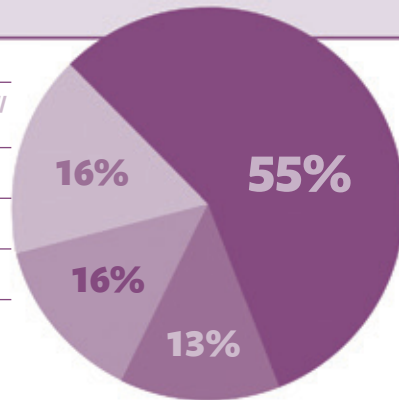

### Lebanon—Theological Education

In 2022, Tyndale House Foundation supported 39 students from the MENA region during the current academic year at **Arab Baptist Theological Seminary**. The seminary is located in Lebanon and serves a region of over 300 million people. ABTS President Elie Haddad shared, “For the Church in Lebanon [and the region] today, we are the main instrument through whom God chooses to fulfill his mission. When in crisis after crisis, the Church community is the one to pastor its society, to care for the needy, to protect the vulnerable, to bring hope to the hopeless, to pray for those in power, to make peace, to model an alternative way of living and behaving.

Today, we can see God moving through our students and graduates who are serving the Lord through pastoring churches, teaching the Word of God at schools and colleges, leading home groups and Bible studies, training other leaders, serving refugees, leading worship, preaching, planting churches, starting Bible schools, leading youth meetings, serving in women’s and children’s ministries, and sharing the gospel through different media outlets.”



### Haiti—Christian Education

**New Life for Haiti** had hoped to spend their 2022 grant on a new infrastructure that would give the School of Hope electricity through solar power and allow them to build a digital library to better support their teachers and students. However, unrest and other challenges in the economy forced them to delay that project and respond to more urgent needs. New Life for Haiti’s in-country field director said, “Bandit groups block the gas terminals, and the police intervene to unblock, but the gas stations don’t want to see fuel on the formal market. They want to sell on the informal market to make more money. This makes life much more complicated in Haiti. Since it’s difficult to access fuel, the price of transportation is very high and becoming higher and higher.

Because of that, the situation becomes very difficult for students.” The grant from Tyndale House Foundation was redesignated to allow New Life for Haiti to support the school and respond to existing needs. In October, they were able to open their doors to a new class of kindergartners and its first class of seventh graders! They were also able to expand their administration team by adding a new administrator, liaison, and secretary. One of their new seventh graders said, “The School of Hope is going to change my life because now I will have a great education. And I don’t have to cross the river to go to school, even if there is rain . . . even if the river is high. I like attending school here because it is beautiful. I like the way the teachers teach us. I like the way the principal encourages us. And I like being with my friends at school.”



### Myanmar—Theological Education

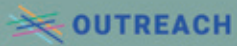
In Myanmar, the 2021–22 school year was marked by multiple lockdowns caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and military coups that restricted people from leaving their homes for fear of imminent danger. Yet 21 students at **Beulah Theological Seminary (BTS)**, who were not allowed to travel home, found themselves cared for, fed, and able to continue their studies thanks to their dedicated staff and resources from supporters. Later in the year, 40 new students arrived on campus to begin studies. In addition to a grant to support the academic needs of students, THF gave a special grant of \$17,000 to purchase a generator to keep the school up and running as the government started rationing electrical energy, allotting BTS only about four hours each day. This generator has allowed them to pump water from the well and provide light, modest air conditioning, and power for their computers and musical instruments. One new student shared, “We have to run from here to there for fear of fighting and the military. Sometimes we have to sleep in the jungle where wild animals are grazing. We don’t know when we die or if we continue to live. It’s not easy living in such situation. Thank God that I could reach BTS.”

# Local Grants

\$321,000 awarded to 13 partners

We want to be good neighbors and care for our own community. To accomplish this, we partner with organizations in the Greater Chicago Metropolitan Area working with vulnerable populations. These groups include children and youth, immigrants and refugees, women and men who have escaped the sex trade, prisoners, people experiencing homelessness, and young mothers facing unplanned pregnancies.

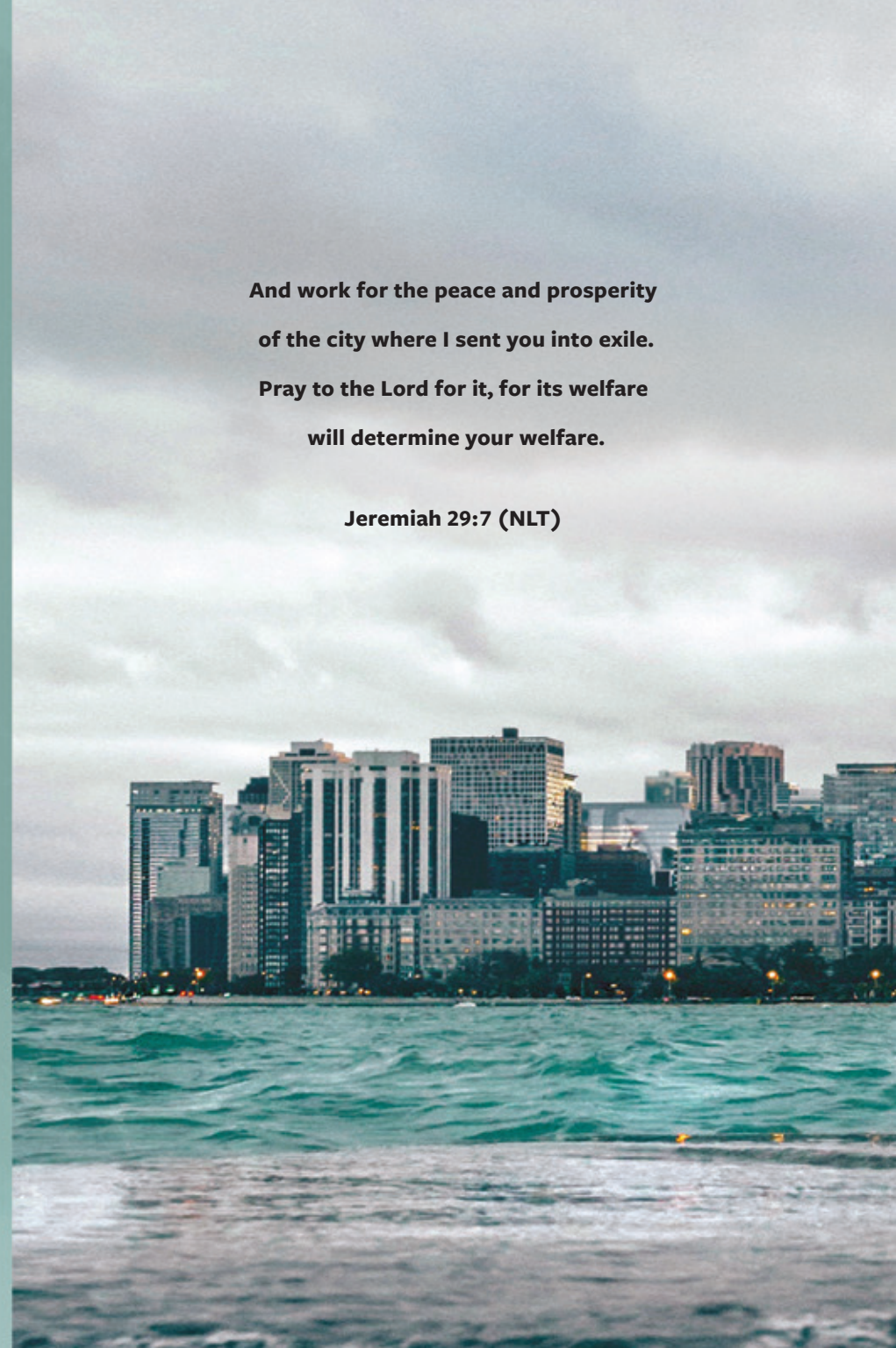

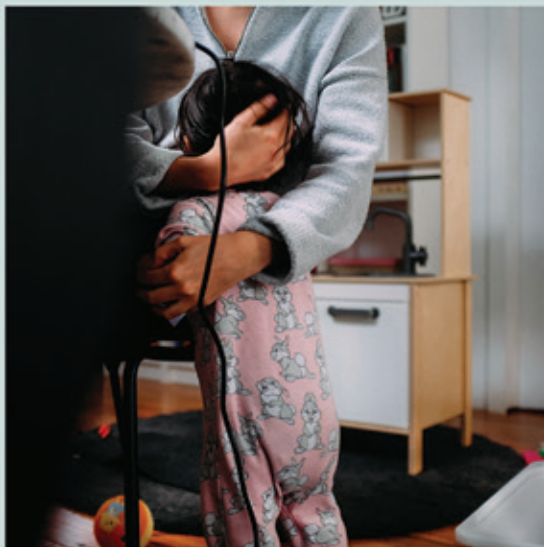

## Caring Network

Lucia came to **Caring Network** at a loss about what to do about her unexpected pregnancy, saying she “*hadn’t even thought about it.*” During her appointment, she said that she was scared and worried about how the baby’s father would react to the news and was concerned about completing her education. She needed time to process her decision, so she scheduled a follow-up appointment for an ultrasound. When she returned, she still was undecided and was being pressured to abort by someone she thought she could trust. During her consultation, Lucia decided that she really wanted to choose life and tell her family about her pregnancy. She left Caring Network equipped to share the news and empowered with parenting resources and support. Feeling more confident about becoming a mom, Lucia expressed gratitude several times.

# Discipleship Grants

We believe the Great Commission calls us to invest in spiritual development in addition to evangelism and church planting. We seek to partner with organizations working to shape a believer's understanding, attitude, and behavior toward that of Jesus Christ at each stage of their Christian journey. In this area, we have a special emphasis in evangelistic outreach, leadership development, Scripture engagement, and youth ministry.

**Youth Ministry.** Investing in the next generation through mentorship, enabling youth to become Christlike leaders who effect change in their homes, churches, and communities.

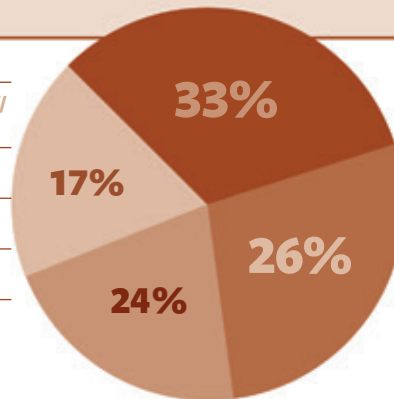

### **Africa**—Leadership Development

In Nairobi, Kenya, 60 marketplace leaders participated in an annual cohort with **Resource Global**, where they received biblical teaching and mentorship that equipped them to integrate their faith and work. The cohort brought together professionals from healthcare, marketing, finance, legal, tech, and other industries. One participant shared, “My view of the marketplace has changed significantly. I never doubted that my vocation was God-ordained, but I’ve learned that we are priests before we are bankers, engineers, or teachers. I now see every task as an opportunity to seek God and ask him to show me how to ‘shine’ for him. For example, forgiving others or standing up for justice even when the injustice doesn’t directly affect us. It’s a process, but I can say that slowly but surely, my beliefs on priesthood are translating into actions.”



### **Europe**—Discipleship

In the most secular continent in the world, Christian leaders often lack training, resources, and hope. That’s why the **European Leadership Forum (ELF)** has been working to unite, equip, and resource evangelical leaders across the European continent. Through an annual gathering as well as year-long mentorships and networking groups, ELF invested in more than 300 leaders in 2022. Leaders received training on the most challenging attacks against the gospel and overcame feelings of hopelessness and isolation. One leader said, “I am grateful to God, to you, and to all the brothers and sisters who make the ELF a reality. I feel privileged, blessed, and honored to receive this opportunity. I now pray for a big impact in Europe and beyond and will do my best to put what I’ve received here into practice for my country.”



### Asia—Scripture Engagement

Across Asia, students participated in a Scripture engagement initiative offered through the **International Fellowship of Evangelical Students**. The goal of this initiative was to renew in-person Bible study and Scripture reading. One leader said, “This is a core part of our DNA—seeing students empowered to lead in challenging contexts through engagement with Scripture in the context of close fellowship and prayer.” More than 200 students came together to study Scripture in community with one another and learn how to apply the text in contemporary realities. One student reflected on the training in this way: “I see in the Bible an almighty God who dwells in unapproachable light yet invites us to dialogue with him in our honest struggles. God is big enough to handle our doubts, anxieties, fears, and frustrations. This certainly includes the trauma of broken socio-economic and political realities, as Gideon illustrates.”



### North America—Youth Ministry

In today’s fast-paced world, parents often have little or no time to prepare before they have to respond to cultural trends and challenges their teens are facing. **Axis** does the hard work of interpreting cultural trends to keep parents in the know and equips them to share biblical truths through the lens of pop culture. Through these resources, parents can quickly help their teens wrestle through issues around addiction, loneliness, violence, and friendships and point them to Jesus at the same time. One parent said, “Your resources are so helpful for breaking things down and helping parents approach topics in a relatable and God-honoring way. Having worked with teens for thirty years and currently having four of my own, Axis is the best resource I’ve found for parents!” One conversation at a time, families are being transformed, and teens are being pointed back to God.

# Compassion Grants

We do this through partnering with organizations working to alleviate the distress of those experiencing hardship caused by conflict, war, and natural disasters through physical help and spiritual hope. **Children at Risk.** Rescuing children from poverty and dangerous circumstances and helping them find redemption, help, and hope in Jesus Christ.

**Community Development.** Restoring communities ravaged by war, conflict, and natural disasters.

**Humanitarian Relief.** Providing refugee care and addressing people’s physical and spiritual needs through times of extreme hardship.

**Reconciliation.** Bridging divides caused by religious conflict through training and creative outreach efforts.

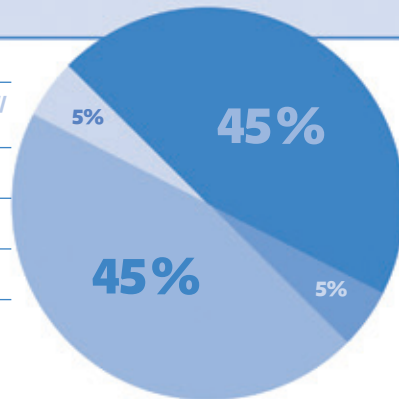

## A Story of Victory

Namazzi faced unimaginable hardship from an early age. She never knew her mother, and her father abandoned her with her grandmother in the Mubende region of Uganda when she was very young. But because of her grandmother's cruelty and abuse, she ran away and ended up in a crime-ridden slum in a large city. The wrongs she endured twisted her sense of value: Namazzi began to hate herself. When she was just 12 years old, Namazzi turned to drugs to cope with the trauma of abuse. By age 13, she was entrapped in a brothel, addicted to opiates and pregnant. With no support system, she was forced to give birth alone—without medical care—twice. Her first baby tragically died in child-birth; the father took her second baby away. Barely into her teens, Namazzi had already lost two children.





**In 2022, 551 children were brought out of the sex trade in Uganda thanks to our partner, Destiny Rescue. They are all currently enrolled in DR's reintegration program, offering shelter, food, trauma-informed counseling, reconciliation services, job training, and connections with a local church.**

## **Life in the Brothel**

Brothels in Uganda ensnare young women and children by charging desperate girls exorbitant rent daily for a place to stay. To keep a roof over her head, Namazzi sold the only thing she had: her body. Namazzi was forced to go to extremes to continue living with the guilt and self-loathing she endured. She fell even deeper into her drug addiction—to the point of using stolen jet fuel to get high. Hopeless and hurting, she began to think of herself in a term locals use for addicts: spoilt. But one day, as she was in the act of taking drugs, someone stopped to talk to her.

## **A Way Out**

That person was one of our Destiny Rescue rescue agents. Namazzi resisted when he offered her a way out of her desperate situation. “No one had ever helped me,” said Namazzi. “I had lost hope.” Gripped by hopelessness, she argued that nothing could be done for her. “I thought God was not there,” she said.

But our rescue agent didn't give up. Drawn by the offer of food, Namazzi finally took the first step toward freedom by enrolling in our residential program. Her journey to freedom wasn't easy. Moving into the home brought its own challenges. During her first month, Namazzi suffered terrible withdrawal symptoms as her body responded to life without drugs. She was wracked by guilt and shame, worried that she'd end up 'spoiling' the other girls in the home. Things came to a head

when a few other girls, still early in their recovery journeys, reminded her of the darkness of her past. Overwhelmed with self-loathing, she attempted to end her life by jumping into a deep well.

## **A Turning Point**

But her story didn't end there. Namazzi survived the fall and was discovered by one of the other girls in the home. Even then, she fought rescue: she yelled to the other girl, “Don't tell anyone; I want to die in here.” Despite her protests, Namazzi was freed and brought back to the home. The counselors tenderly guided her to gradually develop a healthier view of herself. Namazzi recalls realizing that “all the girls who are here also went through the same situation.”

As her counseling continued, she came to see herself as God sees her: a cherished child worthy of his love. “I found the Lord. Because...the project changed me, I serve the Lord,” Namazzi shared.

One night, Namazzi had a startling dream. In it, she heard a voice tell her to change her name. In her language, her new name means “victory.” That name change is indicative of what has happened in Victory's life. Now, Victory praises God in the church choir and even counsels other girls with similar stories. She has plans to open her own boutique. Her songs are full of joy, and her heart is full of gratitude: “I thank the Lord God. I thank you all for bringing this project to my area. Thank you very much!”

**Christian Writers.** Encouraging the development of local authors through teaching them the necessary skills to express their unique voice by writing and to address culturally relevant issues from a biblical perspective.

**Church Planters.** Fostering multiplicative growth of the church through indigenous-led movements that create fellowships of spiritual depth, theological integrity, and vibrancy.

**Ministry Training.** Engaging, equipping, and empowering leaders in their unique callings to be catalysts of change and growth.

**Pastor Training.** Ensuring pastors are properly equipped with biblical knowledge and maturity to shepherd their congregations well.

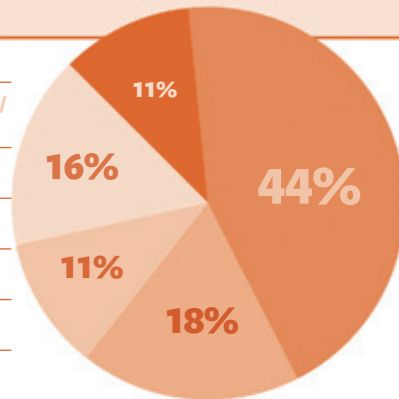

### Latin America—Ministry Training

In May of 2022, **VIVA Network** received a grant to complete the publication of *God's Heart for Children: Practical Theology from Global Perspectives*. This book is the fruit of two years' worth of research done by a student working toward her PhD at Fuller Theological Seminary. Authored by 27 contributors from 20 countries, *God's Heart for Children* is a vibrant work that includes practitioner contributions and case studies that reflect issues that at-risk children face today. The book was written for students of theology, mission, and child development, as well as ministry and church leaders. The global launch occurred virtually in June of 2022 and had over 200 participants from 20+ countries. Excluding sales from Amazon, over 500 copies were sold in the first six months. Copies have been received in more than 30 countries including Australia, Brazil, Canada, Costa Rica, DRC, Ethiopia, France, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Kenya, Lebanon, Malaysia, Myanmar, New Zealand, Nigeria, Norway, Philippines, and others. One recipient of the book shared, "I'm organizing, with another colleague . . . a couple of conferences next year which hope to encourage theological research in work with children. We were just saying the other day that we were struggling to find global voices in this area, and so this is an absolute delight to find! Thank you so much."



### Egypt—Pastor Training

From March to June 2022, 37 youth pastors from evangelical and Coptic Orthodox churches throughout Egypt gathered to cultivate community and receive training facilitated by **Hope4MENA** to support their youth ministries. The group participated in four conferences where they studied topics on the inspiration of Scripture, Bible study and interpretation, the Incarnation, the Trinity, evangelism and mission, identity and value, and healthy relationships. Those who facilitated the conferences shared that they saw the Lord work in the lives of youth leaders, challenging them to repent of their shortcomings, change, be reignited in their passion for God's Word, and ask God to give them a burden for local people and churches. One of the participants shared, "This was my first opportunity to receive biblical teaching on the Trinity, Incarnation, and Christ's redemptive work." This was a turning point in her life—after the training she enrolled in seminary and has begun fulltime vocational ministry at her church!



### Eastern Europe—Church Planter Training

**Communitas International** received a grant in 2022 to train leaders on how to start new missional churches in countries spanning Eastern Europe. Their work built on momentum seen in Russia, Ukraine, and Belarus with pastors and church planters working to shift existing churches to be more missional. However, plans were disrupted with Russia's attack on Ukraine. The ministry quickly pivoted priorities and funding to help with refugee relief and care in Poland, Romania, and Berlin. Even though their plans were upended, God used this as a way to expand the focus of Communitas beyond Russia, Ukraine, and Belarus, into the “-stan” nations of Central Asia and the Balkans. One ministry partner shared, “What the Spirit is doing in the lives of people directly affected by enemies in their midst is astounding. They give credit to their training, which has taught them to see opportunities they would have fled from in the past (such as serving enemy soldiers) as opportunities to see the gospel move forward.” Even though plans were significantly altered, God used 2022 to provide clarity on how to train national church planters through the war, and leaders have been incorporating this new knowledge into the training. Despite the unexpected situation, they were able to reach and train over 350 pastors through in-person seminars and online courses.



### Ghana—Christian Writer Training

Africans passionate about magazine publishing from four countries gathered in Ghana in November 2022 to participate in an Introduction to Magazine Publishing course hosted by **Magazine Training International (MTI)**. One of the course facilitators shared, “People came for training and left with hope, empowerment, resources, and friends to spur them on in their publishing journeys,” and in the words of one participant, “This training has been very insightful. I have learnt so many practical and actionable things I can implement easily, and a lot of inspiration for new projects. I have also acquired some new skills. I have been challenged to work hard and with more intentionality so that I can excel in my publishing ministry for God's glory.” Approximately 30 participants and six trainers spent a week of intensive training in sessions on magazine design, management, and editing in English and French. “The MTI training has been transformational and very timely,” said another participant. “I am so glad I attended. Thank you for coming all the way to Ghana to run this professional and excellent training for Christian publishers, writers, and designers. It will revolutionize and accelerate Christian magazine publishing in Ghana and West Africa.”

In 1962, Kenneth N. Taylor founded Tyndale House Publishers as a way of publishing his book *Living Letters*— a paraphrase of the New Testament Epistles written in everyday, easy-to-understand English. Thanks to early partnership from the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, the book became a runaway bestseller. In 1963, Ken and his wife, Margaret, started Tyndale House Foundation so that they could give away royalty money from the rapidly increasing sales. Since *Living Letters* was God’s Word, any royalty income should be considered God’s money, they decided. Through Tyndale House Foundation, all royalties from *Living Letters*, *The Living Bible* (published in 1971), and the New Living Translation (launched in 1996) have been distributed to mission organizations operating all around the world.

In 2001, Ken and Margaret transferred ownership of Tyndale House Publishers to the Foundation, adding millions of dollars in annual dividend payments to the Foundation’s ability to create and strengthen partnerships through grantmaking. In 2019, Tyndale House Publishers and Tyndale House Foundation merged into a single organization and operate today as sister divisions of Tyndale House Ministries. Today, Tyndale House Foundation remains totally committed to the legacy of radical generosity passed down to us from our founder.

Current THF president Jeremy Taylor represents the third generation of Taylor family leadership of the Foundation, and he continues to oversee several million dollars in grants paid to other Christian ministries and mission organizations each year. The Foundation is governed by a Board of mission professionals who ensure that the Foundation’s resources are stewarded and allocated wisely. Since 1963, Tyndale House Foundation has distributed more than \$120 million (equal to \$234 million in today’s dollars) through grants and program spending, all to the glory of God.
